#### **GOVERNANCE**

Independent schools are generally not-for-profit institutions founded by groups in the community.
All Independent schools are registered with the relevant state or territory education authorities.

Independent schools are primarily accountable to their parent and school communities.

Forty-seven (20 per cent) Independent schools in Queensland operate within an approved system authority. These include the Lutheran, Anglican and Seventh Day Adventist Systems.

All QLD Independent schools comply with relevant state and federal education legislation and regulation.

### STUDENT ENROLMENTS

The rate of growth of the Independent school sector has been increasing. In 2022, enrolments in QLD Independent schools grew by 3.8 per cent.

# **SOURCES OF INCOME**

Most of the income of Independent schools comes from families. Governments save an estimated \$940 million in funding due to the contribution to Queensland Independent schools from families and other private sources.

# **GOVERNMENT FUNDING OF QLD INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS**

Government funding for schools is provided by the Australian Government and the Queensland state government. The Australian Government is the main government funding source for non-government schools, providing 79 per cent of total government recurrent funding while the state provides 21 per cent. The state government is the main funding source for government schools. The proportions of private/government funding vary greatly from school to school.

#### **FUNDING MODEL**

The current funding model for schools, the Schooling Resource Standard (SRS) comprises base funding plus loadings to address educational disadvantage. Base funding for Independent schools is adjusted according to the school community's estimated capacity to contribute (CTC) to the costs of education, assessed on parental income tax data. This methodology is known as the Direct Measure of Income (DMI). Schools with a higher CTC score receive less per capita base funding.



#### MAIN SOURCES OF CAPITAL INCOME

On average, parents and communities provide 86 per cent of capital funding for Independent schools in Queensland. The amount of capital funding in Queensland Independent schools from private sources in 2021 was \$237 million.

Most capital funding is sourced through borrowing, fund raising, levies on parents or school reserves.

# AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENT CAPITAL GRANTS PROGRAM FOR QLD

In 2021 the Australian Government provided \$9.5 million in capital grants to Queensland Independent schools. In 2022 it is estimated that grants for the Queensland Independent sector will total approximately \$16.8 million.

In the Independent sector Australian Government capital grants are distributed on a needs basis through Block Grant Authorities, with priority given to disadvantaged school communities with the least capacity to raise funds.

# QLD STATE CAPITAL FUNDING

In 2021 the Queensland Government provided \$28.9 million in capital grants to Queensland Independent schools.

# **SCHOOL TEACHERS**

Independent schools employ more than 19 per cent of all teachers in Australian schools. Queensland Independent schools employ more than 16.5 per cent of all teachers in Queensland schools.
