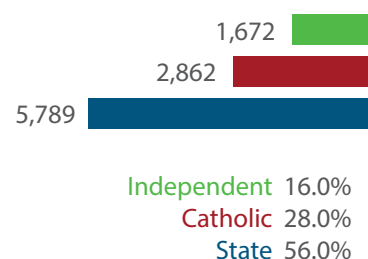

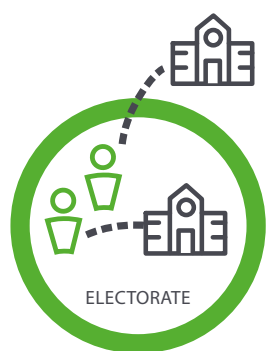

Total Students, by Sector, Attending Schools Located in this Electorate



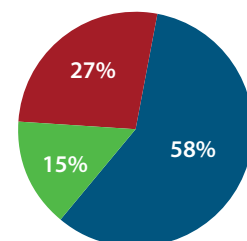
